Why attendance is important in school for students?

Parents are welcome to attend any of the sessions and/or the booths over the lunch hour. Parents can ask specific questions about tuition, residences, scholarship & application deadlines, etc. which students might not be as interested in asking yet. This is <u>your opportunity to ask questions</u>! This PSE/Career Day includes grade10, 11 & 12 students from Esterhazy, Langenburg and Churchbridge.

U of S Open House ~ Grade 12 students will be attending the U of S Open House on September 23rd. Many students have signed up already for the sessions that they want to take part in. This should be a great day to get acquainted with the U of S campus.

Any grade 12 student wishing to write the **SAT** or **ACT tests** (usually required if attending college in the USA or Internationally) can pick up information from Student Services, but you need to register at <u>sat.collegeboard.org</u> before the deadline. The nearest test writing locations for the **ACT** are the **University of Regina** and at a high school **in Brandon**. Register for that test at <u>actstudent.org</u>.

I will be meeting with all grade 12s regarding graduation and their postsecondary plans. Please ask them about the information s/he received at the **Grade 12 meeting** with me on September 15th. Please keep this info in a safe place for when s/he realizes it is needed. One very important piece of information is the Saskatchewan Learning Student Profile (Transcript) that needs to be sent directly from the government. All post-secondary institutions require you to order an official transcript from Sask. Learning. Here is the website that you order your transcripts from: <u>https://www.k12.gov.sk.ca/etranscript/</u> Many universities now accept applications earlier in the year than their spring deadline. Please apply early to your university of choice. The earlier you apply the earlier you find out if you are accepted. This will help you make more informed decisions in the spring concerning other universities and scholarships.

Applications to Saskatchewan Polytechnic can also be completed online for \$80 compared to the \$100 fee for paper submissions. The application for programs for FIRST QUALIFIED FIRST ADMITTED, Saskatchewan Polytechnic opened September 1st. If you are applying to a program that is a COMPETITIVE ENTRY, the applications open on October 1st and the application process is a little more complicated. You need to come and see Ms. LeSann if you are applying to either program because documents need to be sent directly from the school to the SaskPolytech Campus that you have applied.
